Pastor's Message

Dear Friends,

It is helpful to remember the early roots of the word**Lent**. It refers to the lengthening of days. Springtime. We are leaning into the light, emerging from the long nights and lingering shadows of winter. The promise of new life unfolds in the warmth of longer days.

And so through these Lenten days we join the journey from darkness into light, the light no darkness can overcome.

In a remarkable way the Gospel readings we will hear in March during Sunday worship (and then discuss in out Lenten Bible Study), illuminate the way of the Lenten journey through the darkness into the light of God's promise of new life for us and the whole creation...

• To begin with (March 5) there is the story of Nicodemus who slips through the darkness of night to explore who Jesus is, this Jesus who has been stirring things up on the holy city of Jerusalem, puzzling those who were convinced they had all the right handles on religious correctness. But when Jesus says that in order to really get it, you've got to be born again, that God's Spirit blows right into and through us in ways we can barely imagine and opens our eyes to see light we cannot see for ourselves, Nicodemus slips back into the night, back into the mystery that will continue to swirl within him until one day it transforms him. Sometimes it can be a long journey through the shadows into the light.

• Then there is that Samaritan woman at the well, the woman with whom Jesus had absolutely no good reason to even talk with but did, stunningly violating long held right religious barriers as he did. Walls of division and suspicion come tumbling down. Light breaks out and the woman is given to taste of the water from the well of life Jesus offers, the well which will never run dry, the well that offers the promise of abundance of life only God can provide. When the journey is long and dry, Jesus offers to quench our thirst, opening our eyes to lean into tomorrow with trust.

• Then there is the extraordinary story of the man born blind who is not only given 20-20 vision to see the world in all of its color and beauty and fullness, but who is even more graced with the vision to see and know the astonishing truth that Jesus not only breaks the darkness of our days but is the source and provider of all that is good and lasting, of all that mends and makes new, even in the face of stubborn doubt and resistance.

• Then finally in this series of holy, light giving stories comes the account of Jesus' refusal to allow death to have a final and lasting grip on life. We need to ready our ears for the way Jesus, despite the grave uncertainty and protests of those around, shouts his death-bound friend Lazarus into life. "Lazarus, come out of that tomb," Jesus cries. The earth shakes and Lazarus steps out among them, now unbound, free to live a new life. Into and through and beyond the darkness of our deepest depths Jesus calls us into the life of his unfailing light.

So the lengthening days Lent lead us toward the light. Lent delivers us to the very doorstep of the defining story of our life together, to the crucifixion of Jesus when darkness covered the whole earth and all was lost, to the eerie silence of death and utter heartbreak, to those stunning echoes from an empty tomb still transforming our lives, calling us, leading us, accompanying us from the darkness into light.

Come, join the journey through these lengthening days! Pray that you will know the life giving grace and healing power of the light no darkness can overcome.

Transition Process Information for March A note from your Transition Consultant, Deacon Natalie

March is an active and important month for St. Andrew's Transition Process! Please mark your calendars now and plan to join your faith community in conversation and discernment of your future. YOU have agency in how you will move forward. St. Andrew needs everyone's voice and participation in the process.

MARCH 5th after worship - Healthy Communication Workshop

St. Andrew is in a time of transition, of discerning your future and preparing for the next stage of St. Andrew's faith journey. Discernment requires critical conversations and, although life-giving, difficult conversations are often met with resistance and anxiety. And, of course, along with anything new comes *change*. Change is all about new life and new possibilities. And yes, change can be hard ... But that's okay! We have an app for that! No ... not really an app, but we do have a tried and true, proven effective set of skills that till the earth and nurture the soil of communication.

Healthy Communication is key to a church's health and missional vitality. **So, please join us on March 5 for the Healthy Communication Workshop.** It's a light-hearted approach and we'll have fun as we practice listening well and speaking with care – skills that are necessary for important conversations about St. Andrew's future.

The link to the Zoom session will be sent to all St. Andrew members the week before. The Transition Team is working on plans to project the Zoom live in the church fellowship room so you can come to church and participate if you prefer not to do so at home.

MARCH 26th after worship - Finding Your WHY event

Why you are a part of St. Andrew? This question will lead us into the first stage of Finding Your WHY.

This event is the foundation and first step for articulating St. Andrew's WHY statement – a statement of who you are as a church: your purpose, your identity, your unique calling and reason for existing. Why does your congregation do what you do? Why do you exist? This statement is not only an important foundation for the work of discernment but also appears on the first page of the Ministry Site Profile of churches going into the Call Process.

MARCH 27th – APRIL 5TH - Finding Your WHY Small Group Conversations

During this two-week period, you will participate in a small group conversation with Transition Team members. The purpose of these conversations is to dig deeper and enhance the work done during the March 26 event. We need to hear more about your thoughts on St. Andrew's WHY so the Transition Team can draft statements for the congregation to consider.

There will be a schedule of in-person and Zoom conversations, including daytime and evening. As soon as the schedule is set, you will be asked to sign-up for a specific day and time.

So, mark your calendars! You don't want to miss out on any of these important opportunities to share your voice, experience, and perspective! EVERYONE is a part of the transition process.
