THIS SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 5... ALL SAINTS SUNDAY!

This Sunday, November 5, we gather together to sing, pray and give God thanks for <u>all</u> the saints!

When St. Paul opened many of his letters to the churches that he knew so well with the greeting "To all the saints and faithful ones of...."

he was reminding them, and us, that all the baptized people, claimed as God's beloved and called to be living witnesses of God's love, are indeed saints.

Yes, we are all saints! You and me. (And, yes, as Martin Luther so clearly reminded us — not only saints but sinners too. Flawed but forgiven sinners, and broken, bumbling, but yet beloved saints at once we are.)

The tradition of the Church invites us on All Saints Day to remember those whose lives have been a blessing to us and who have died and gone before us. And that we do with thanksgiving in song and prayer. The bells will ring at the mention of their names in our worship. And our hearts, still tinged with grief but yet full of gratitude, will beat an extra beat or two as we hear their names.

So as we worship this week, let us give thanks to God for <u>all</u> the saints ... for the saints who have gone before us, for the saints still among us, and for the saints of God still to come. Give thanks for the examples of faithful living that the saints have given us as they navigated the stormy waters of life, and also for the faithful acts of service we are empowered by God's Holy Spirit to do in our own seas. We give thanks, too, for the fullness of eternal life in which the saints of God who have gone before us now

partake and which we have yet to fully enjoy. (This italicized paragraph is from <u>Sundays and Seasons</u>, a worship guide from Augsburg-Fortress Press.)

A Summary of our Hopes and Expectations and More for Shared Ministry

At the Collaborative Ministry Committee meeting on Wednesday evening, November 1, representatives from the four Lutheran congregations of Bristol/Plainville shared the results of their October congregational conversations focused on their "Hopes, Expectations and the Possible Roadblocks" to further steps in shared, collaborative ministry.

After reviewing the summaries from each congregation, the Collaboration Committee discussed further possible steps and developments in shared ministry. (Since the meeting was held after this edition of the NewsNotes was prepared, a summary of the meeting will appear in next week's edition.)

St. Andrew's representatives on the Four Church Committee include Karen Biernat, Arlene Creswell, Owen VanBrocklin and Pastor Swenson. Pastor Steven Wilco, Associate to the Bishop four New England Synod, is facilitating the continuing Committee efforts.

Here is a summary of our lively, thoughtful congregational conversations on October 15 that were presented to the Collaborative Committee. Thanks to Karen Biernat for her fine work writing this recap.


Hopes and Possible Roadblocks to Collaboration/ Merger with Area Lutheran Churches

<u>Hopes</u>

- 1. That merging/collaborating churches are encouraged to carry their strengths to a unified entity
- 2. That financial disclosure of willing churches would show that at a minimum a 3 to 1 merger is financially feasible while maintaining Meals for Neighbors ministry
- 3. That a merged church would provide more opportunities to grow including Saturday Service, Confirmation, Youth Group, etc.
- 4. That a merged church would provide financial security and new energy and would include a strong music program, Sunday School, Confirmation, Parish Life
- 5. That we would keep our SAELC building

Possible Roadblocks

- 1. All four churches have their own identity/building/history
- 2. That many are not willing to give up their building
- 3. That high energy is required for the process and that the timeline may be too fast for some and too slow for others
- 4. That there is a lack of clarity of vision
- 5. That society is changing and there is lower church attendance
